The Montfort Care Early Intervention Programme aims to detect hearing impairment in children during their first year of life and provide timely therapy, medical support, education, and effective integration into society both academically and socially.

As a leading guidance center in their area of operation, Montfort Care raises awareness among the general public and medical community, conducts early hearing screenings, and improves access to therapy, medical treatment, hearing aids, speech therapy, and parent-infant training. Montfort Care's intervention is distinctive in that it addresses all aspects of early intervention and overcomes the obstacles to identification and intervention. Furthermore, the program reaches out to disadvantaged communities and offers these services at nominal costs to make them affordable for economically weaker sections of society in Mumbai.

Established in 1957, our school has experienced remarkable growth and is now equipped with 12 classrooms, catering to the educational needs of 66 children annually. Our primary focus is to provide comprehensive special education for children with hearing impairment.

To this end, we have specially designed classrooms that greatly enhance the educational experience of these students. 04. FROM THE DESK OF DIRECTOR

As we embarked upon this endeavour, our vision was clear: to ensure that all children with hearing loss have equal opportunities to succeed, transcending the barriers imposed by their disabilities. The challenges posed by the pandemic tested our resilience, but it also forged us into a strong and determined community that learned to thrive amidst adversity.

Throughout the year, we organized a multitude of events, including assistive device workshops, care and maintenance sessions, movement therapy workshops, group therapies, and psychological evaluation support. These endeavours were aimed at empowering parents to actively engage in their children's progress, for we firmly believe that an empowered parent can profoundly impact a child's life and ease their journey.

In line with our commitment to accessibility, we established a sub-centre in Kalyan, Mumbai, located at St. Jude's School. This initiative was designed to reduce travel time for parents, enabling them to access speech therapy sessions closer to their homes. By making our services more geographically accessible, we have taken a significant step toward ensuring equal opportunities for all children with hearing loss.

Looking ahead to the coming year, we are thrilled to announce that we are in the process of publishing a comprehensive manual, serving as a guide for professionals working in the field of hearing impairment. This invaluable resource will provide deep insights into AVT therapy, enabling professionals to enhance their expertise and deliver optimal care.

In our pursuit of amplifying the impact of our hearing awareness program, we are determined to strengthen our volunteer management program, to achieve a threefold increase in our outreach. Additionally, we have plans to introduce the Parents and Therapists (PAT) program, which acknowledges the shortage of qualified professionals in the field.

By encouraging parents to become therapists, we will provide them with informal training, effectively preparing them for this role. Furthermore, we will motivate them to pursue formal special education courses, thus expanding our pool of dedicated professionals.

In the realm of technology, we strive to enhance our AVT Care app with new and engaging training videos, transforming it into a valuable resource for parents and professionals alike. Furthermore, we are diligently generating and collecting a wealth of data for further research and studies, with the intent to publish our findings in leading journals, thus contributing to the broader knowledge base in this field.

Our Early Intervention program is dedicated to raising awareness about hearing loss, a disability that often goes unnoticed during the crucial developmental years of a child. Despite the ground level challenges, we are working to overcome obstacles such as lack of awareness, limited resources, and stigma to ensure timely support for children with hearing impairments.


We conduct campaigns aimed at low-income communities, parents, teachers, NGOs, and other key stakeholders. The awareness program highlights the importance of early intervention and provides people with valuable information about the symptoms, causes, and actions to be taken in cases of children identified with hearing loss.

Highlight

We successfully reached out to more than 3000 direct beneficiaries. We reached out to the rural areas like Kholi village, Uttarshiv village, Murbad, Taloja, kombad pada in the interiors of Arrey colony.

Key Message

Measures to help maintain ear health

- Personal hygiene should be maintained
- Not to swim or wash in dirty water.
- If there is discharge from the ear, keep the ears completely dry (do not block the ear with cotton wool) and seek treatment from a health Centre.
- Do not introduce objects into the ear, particularly cotton buds. This can cause wax impaction and produce hearing loss, as well as ear infections.
- Herbal remedies and 'ear candles' are potentially harmful and should not be used.
- Avoid exposure to potentially harmful levels of noise at home and at work. When exposure is unavoidable it is vital to wear ear protection, such as ear plugs.

Hearing Screening Camps

Hearing screenings is conducted for children aged 0-6 years. The screening process, using OAE technology, is designed to detect any signs of hearing loss. We have conducted hearing screenings in government hospitals for newborns and have also successfully screened children in high-risk communities. We provide referrals and guidance to parents and caregivers based on the information obtained from the screenings. This information is then used to develop an appropriate plan for therapy and medical intervention.












Chart 3: No. of babies (boys vs girls) screened for hearing loss across Mumbai

Results of Hearing Screening FY2022-23




Chart 4: Results of the hearing screening conducted on children (0-6 years)

No. of Beneficiaries FY 2022-23




Chart 5: Age wise breakup of children screened for hearing loss.

Highlight

A child should be screened for hearing loss before 1 month of age. Montfort Care screened more than 2600 children (0-6 years) and of which 550 newborn children were screened for hearing loss in FY 2022-23.

Key Message

- More than 35% of children were identified with reversible hearing loss.
- More than 13% of newborn children got referred in reading due to the non-availability of a separate silent room for testing in government hospitals
- All referred children should be tested again within 1 month.
- All the parents are counseled and given development milestones for their child.

AVT and Speech Therapy

Auditory- Verbal therapy is specifically catered to the hearing-impaired children and designed to promote learning through listening using their assistive devices. Users of hearing assistive devices need to be taught to become aware of sounds, associate meaning with them and eventually understand language.

This year we have taught 43 children how to hear, understand and express themselves, thus helping in streamlining these children. We worked on therapies that help these children socialize, develop onlooker, associative and cooperative play and in turn improve their adaptability. Moving away from traditional forms of treatment, we also introduced our children to music therapy and facilitated their overall development through water play, puzzles and pretend play that worked on their cognitive, fine, and gross motor development.












Chart 6: Children taking AVT and Speech therapy at our Centre


Started a rural support program by opening an extension Centre at Kalyan. 12 Children have been mainstreamed and 9 children integrated to Oral school.

08. AUDIOLOGICAL MANAGEMENT



Once a child is found to have a possibility of hearing loss further Audiological Tests are performed. These tests help us to diagnose the type and degree of hearing loss. Once the diagnosis of hearing loss is done, the child is taken up for rehabilitation by fitting appropriate hearing aids

This year we performed an overwhelming number of diagnostic tests 70 Conditioned Play Audiometry,14 Aided Audiometry, 6 immittance, 15 ABR were performed for diagnosing hearing loss for infants less than 6 years. More than 600 OAE screening were done for newborn babies, 36 ear molds & hearing aid trials, 28 mapping sessions, 2 BAHA sessions were taken for the children at our Centre.









09. SUCCESS STORY - HAMDAN



Hamdan was diagnosed with profound hearing loss at 8 months of age, and his parents took him to Wadia hospital for a check-up. He was fitted with hearing aids at 18 months, but due to Covid-19, his parents had to move back to their village in Uttar Pradesh, and Hamdan missed out on speech therapy. When his parents returned to Mumbai in February 2022, they took him to Wadia hospital, and he was referred to Montfort Early Intervention Centre in April 2022.

During this period, Hamdan's mother was unable to care for him as she was pregnant with a second child. At the Centre, he underwent a complete audiological assessment, and he was given a new pair of hearing aids in June 2022. This time, his father was counseled on continuing speech therapy activities at home, with set expectations for Hamdan's progress. Hamdan also enrolled in pre-primary school, and with the regular motivation and guidance of therapists, his father and he practiced speech therapy activities rigorously. Although Hamdan had multiple behavioral issues initially, with four months of therapy and schooling, he became more social in school, and his cognitive skills improved significantly.

As a next step, Hamdan required a cochlear implant to have significant improvement in his hearing. These implants can be quite expensive, costing close to 8 lakhs for one ear. Montfort Care supported Hamdan's family by networking with hospitals, assistive aids companies, and ENT doctors, which helped them get a fully sponsored surgery done in January 2023. The implant was switched on in February 2023, and his mapping and therapy continue at Montfort Care.





10. ADDITIONAL SERVICES



Cochlear Implant Mapping

We started Cochlear implant mapping at our Centre. Cochlear implants are electronic devices that are surgically implanted in the inner ear. The mapping is a process that involves programming and adjusting a cochlear implant to ensure that it provides optimal hearing outcomes for the recipient. The mapping process involves the use of a computer to adjust the settings of the cochlear implant to suit the recipient's comfort levels and threshold for different sounds.

Highlight

Due to our guidance and support, 12 children of our center, got implanted this year. With the efforts of our team, regular mapping, and therapy sessions all our implanted children are enjoying improved hearing, communication, and quality of life.

Psychological Assessment

Special children fall behind, mostly in all areas of development. Psychological Evaluation is important as we get to know the cognitive ability of each child and also gives a direction for our therapy and academic goals. Ms Lea Menzis is a clinical psychologist and has an experience in school psychology, psychological assessments, and mental health. Her interest and passion to work with special children and her commitment to bring about change is unparallel. MCEIC and Ms. Menzis have collaborated to provide scientific assessments to the special children at a very affordable cost, within the premises.

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11. PARTNERS IN PROGRESS

Collaborative Learning



Collaborative learning provides a sense of belonging and acceptance, as they are able to interact and work with others who have similar challenges.

Orientation Program

A parent orientation program was conducted by the Montfort Care team. The aim is to make parents familiarized with the rules and regulations of the Centre, teaching methodologies, aids, and support available for them. The philosophy behind this orientation program was also to expose the parents to the need of healthy eating habits for children with special needs. Nutrition plays an important role in overall development of the child. Healthy child will be regular, active and will have lesser mood swings. We coached the family members in visual and communication strategies using food as a medium.









Har Ghar Hero

Montfort Care hosted a successful Parent Orientation Program on August 20th, 2022, with the aim of encouraging fathers to take an active role in their child's therapy. The program, titled "Har Ghar Hero," focused on educating fathers on their vital role in the rehabilitation process. The event was filled with interactive role plays and a Q&A session that provided a basic understanding of the journey of a special child. The focus was to emphasize the significance of parental involvement in a child's progress and to inform parents about the proper care and maintenance of hearing aids. 21 parents participated, making the program a resounding success.







Parents and Therapists (PAT program)

We have initiated a PAT program wherein we are coaching parents on how to effectively participate in their child's therapy. The parents are encouraged to conduct sessions under the guidance of the therapist. Thereby parents are equipped with the knowledge and skills to support their child's therapy at home, they can provide additional opportunities for learning and reinforce the strategies and techniques used in therapy. We see a significant impact on the child's progress and overall well-being.







Group therapy

The group therapy sessions focus on the development of language, audition, cognition, motor skills, and imitation skills. We celebrated World Music Day with the objective to develop all suprasegmental (intonation, pitch, rhythm) aspects. Musical chairs was played and children explored different musical instruments. and learnt appropriate vocabulary.

Rainy Day group activity was organized wherein we worked on speech imitation, different sounds, one- or two-word phrases. Children learned to discriminate and identify sounds and words. Children recited poems, songs and communicated with others. They learned appropriate vocabulary.

Differentiated instruction specific to children's learning style and abilities ensured that they fully participated and contributed to the learning process.

12. TRIPS AND THRILLS



ZOO trip

An educational trip to Byculla Zoo was organized for 70 children and their parents. The goal was to expand the student's vocabulary on wildlife. The therapy team worked on building vocabulary related to wild animals in three different languages. The day was spent reinforcing vocabulary skills, practicing the sounds of nature, and working on social and pragmatic goals.

The day concluded with snacks, laughter, and a shared commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of these special-needs children.







Museum Trip 29 November 2022

A 'creative cultural lab'; this excursion was to encourage discovery, innovation, and creativity. A holistic learning experience that was relevant to hearing-impaired children. An educational visit was organized for all therapy children along with their parents, to Children's Museum. The goal was to build vocabulary through various exhibits, activities, and programs. The museum team along with therapists worked on language goals through puppet shows and storytelling.

All children had a tour of animals, birds, and the reptile gallery. A drawing activity was undertaken which helped children with the identification of colors. A Clay/Pottery making activity was also undertaken giving children an experiential understanding of shapes, sorting, and categorization. It was uplifting, the parents learned new ways to involve their children in fun activities. At the end of the day, the parents left feeling inspired and empowered to make a difference in their children's lives.

13. SUCCESS STORY - AYAN

At the age of 2, Ayan Lokhande was diagnosed with hearing loss. His parents, who resided in a village, were unaware of the diagnostic tests required for their child. They eventually sought the help of doctors at KEM Hospital in Mumbai, who referred them to Montfort Care. The audiologist at Montfort Care provided counseling to Ayan's parents on possible audiological interventions and conducted all the necessary diagnostic tests. Two hearing aids were fitted, and Ayan began his therapy sessions for language acquisition.

Ayan started his therapy sessions in July 2022 with limited vocabulary and communication skills. He mostly relied on jargon and gestures to communicate. With scheduled Auditory Verbal therapy sessions twice a week, and regular counseling for his parents, Ayan began to show progress. He started responding to his name, participating actively in games and activities, and even started making sentences such as "Give me a big ball" and "Merry Christmas to all". His social skills improved, and he became much more confident.

Ayan's parents were also provided with counseling on providing a healthy and loving environment for their child. With regular guidance, they began implementing home-based activities to meet the goals set by the therapy sessions. This change in environment, along with the therapy sessions, contributed to Ayan's progress and improvement in his language and social skills.







14. LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT

We encourage and organize various capacity-building programs for the team. Learning and development strengthen our performance, innovation, and employee motivation for achieving long-term success.

- One-day workshop conducted by Cochlear under the guidance of Ms. Jaspal Chowdhary, Habilitation Head of the Cochlear Medical Device. The focus was on various strategies for AVT, academic development, and counseling points for parents and case discussions
- Interactive Masterclass for Professional Audiologists in Cochlear Implant Technology (IMPACT). It is an immersive certification program to help become a certified cochlear implant (C) audiologist.
- AUDITORY PROCESSING DISORDERS: IDENTIFICATION & TREATMENT, Organized with Uncleft.
- Two of our senior therapists attended a 3-month certificate course on Principals of Early Language
 Development accredited by AG Bell Academy for Listening and Spoken Language.

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Open Hearing Screening Camp

Through this initiative, we tested 103 beneficiaries, 12 months to octogenarians, for hearing deficiency, and hearing loss. We counseled and referred them for further diagnostics.
